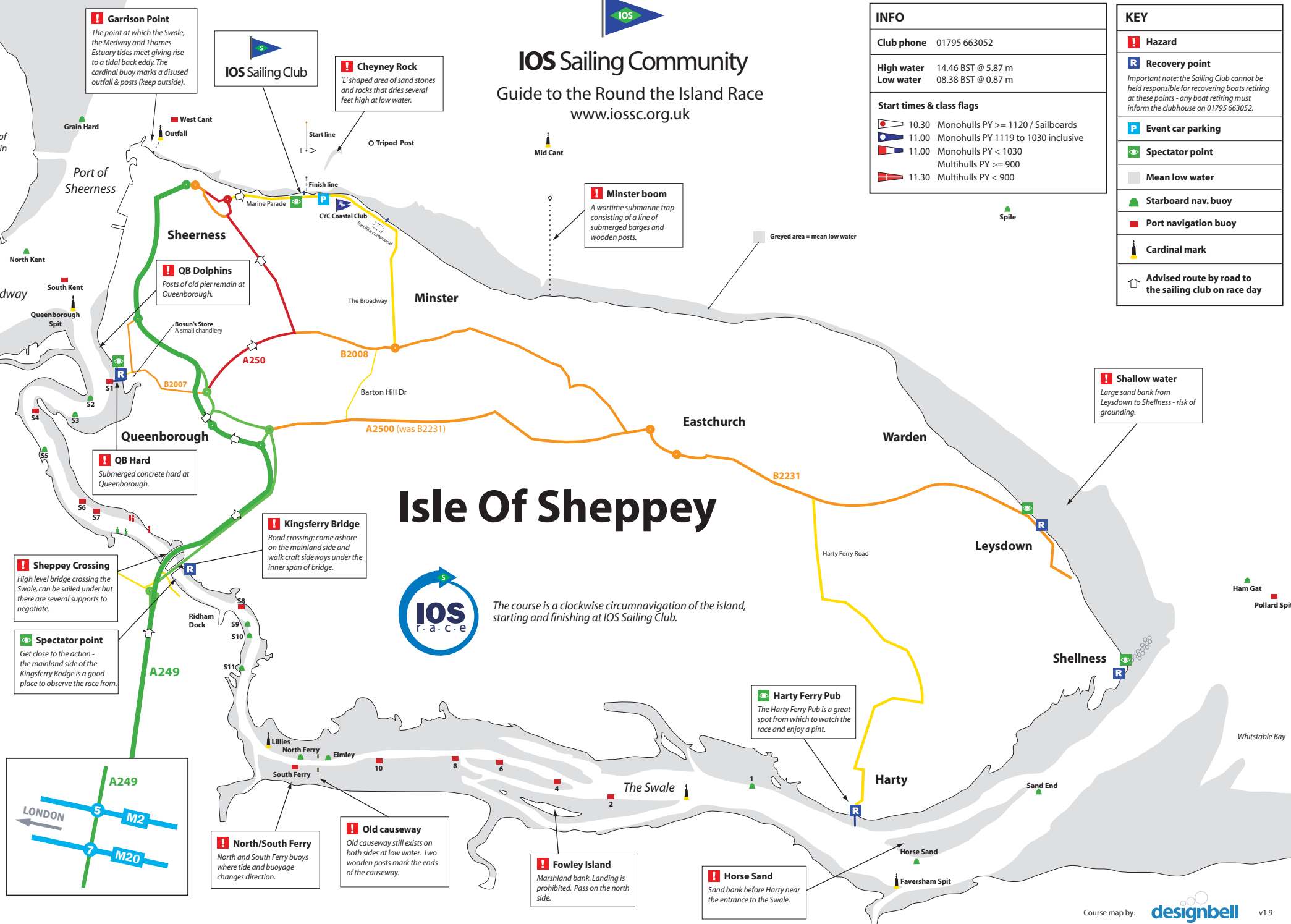

Isle Of Sheppey



The course is a clockwise circumnavigation of the island, starting and finishing at IOS Sailing Club.



Garrison Point
The point at which the Swale, the Medway and Thames Estuary tides meet giving rise to a tidal back eddy. The cardinal buoy marks a disused outfall & posts (keep outside).

IOS Sailing Club

Cheyney Rock
L shaped area of sand stones and rocks that dries several feet high at low water.

Minster boom
A wartime submarine trap consisting of a line of submerged barges and wooden posts.

Shallow water
Large sand bank from Leysdown to Shellness - risk of grounding.

Sheppey Crossing
High level bridge crossing the Swale, can be sailed under but there are several supports to negotiate.

Spectator point
Get close to the action - the mainland side of the Kingsferry Bridge is a good place to observe the race from.



North/South Ferry
North and South Ferry buoys where tide and buoyage changes direction.

Old causeway
Old causeway still exists on both sides at low water. Two wooden posts mark the ends of the causeway.

Fowley Island
Marshland bank. Landing is prohibited. Pass on the north side.

Horse Sand
Sand bank before Hartly near the entrance to the Swale.
